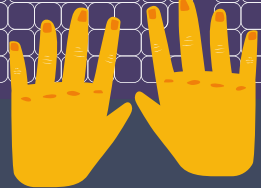

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Foreword

Another year has gone by and plenty has been achieved. ADC has a history of struggle, quest for new horizons, and participation in exigent but crucial discussions. Those that may contribute to a better world but pose a challenge. A challenge because they require many people to agree. A challenge because governments should also seek mutual understanding to harmonize their interests. A challenge because the corporate sector must provide their perspective as

well, often diverging from that of governments.

In this increasingly complex scenario, we continued striving throughout 2023 for a bold positioning in the international, regional, and domestic arenas, especially as facilitators in the discussion of intricate issues regarding fundamental principles and rights in their relationship with the digital environment. As a civil society referent, we sought to promote effective and substantial participation in the debates within both, the public and private sectors. It is a monumental challenge that inspires and motivates us in our daily lives.

Our pursuits in the global realm were crowned with a strong presence in CSISAC, the engagement group that channels civil society participation in the OECD Committee on Digital Economy Policy. We

also led efforts to strengthen the RIPD (Ibero-American Data Protection Network) Civil Society Forum, bearing in mind that this commitment yields better results when undertaken jointly. Regarding the right to freedom of speech, we coordinated two days of reflection sessions on the problem of disinformation in Latin America together with the Bertelsmann Stiftung Foundation (Germany). As to artificial intelligence, we joined the PAI (Partnership on AI) Steering Committee, a coalition recently formed to address urgent issues on its governance.

Our activities were not limited, however, to expanding their thematic and geographical scope, but we also continued developing initiatives around the issues that habitually compose our agenda. Thus, we launched the PubliElectoral app in Chile and Brazil to monitor electoral



processes, and we intensified our work regarding the Judiciary, organizing events and developing reports on the Magistracy Council.

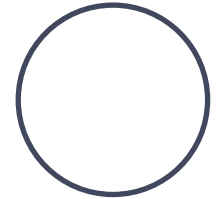
At the domestic level, we achieved a momentous precedent-setting court ruling through which the Argentine government was compelled to inform the technological tools and security protocols it uses to protect any personal data collected. We also persisted in seeking common ground with the corporate sector by sharing our recommendations for the adoption of a digital perspective in the National Action Plans on Business and Human Rights.

Last but not least, this year saw the launch of the ADC Fellowship, a mentorship aimed at Latin American researchers and academics committed to the defense of fundamental rights in the digital world. On

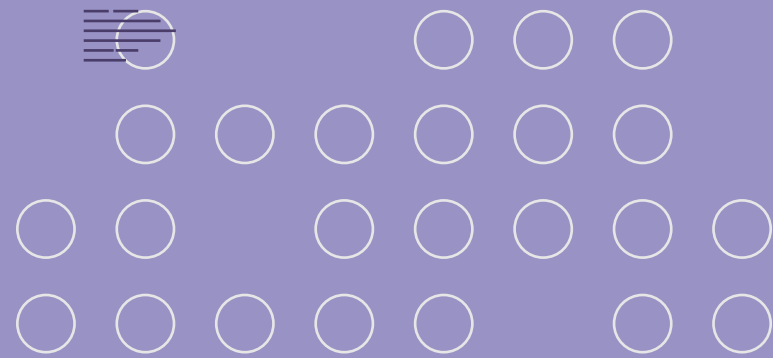
this occasion, the grantees from Chile and Bolivia inquired into the digital dimension of gender-based political violence.

2023 was an intense year full of challenges. In my view, one of the assurances obtained and on which we intend to persevere is that in today's world, questions enlighten more than answers. It is vital to open instances for debate so that new concerns may arise rather than lecture on topics, even those in which we are seen as experts. 2024 appears as a complex year, at both the domestic and global levels, and ADC will be, once again as it has been for almost thirty years, striving to make its sincere contribution to building a better world.

International presence





Throughout 2023, ADC continued to be a human rights referent specialized in the digital sphere in the different international forums where we act. From this position, we increased our influence and broadened our scope of participation by establishing interaction with new actors from civil society, on the one hand, and governments and corporations on the other.

From an assertive stance on data protection, we led the efforts of the RIPD (Ibero-American Data Protection Network) Civil Society Forum, building new ties that are expected to endure in the coming year. On the 20th anniversary of the Network, our executive director, Valeria Milanes, attended a commemorative meeting in Guatemala, where she spoke about future challenges. In addition, together with the member organizations of the Forum, we engaged in joint activity

by developing three comparative studies of the data protection agencies in Argentina, Mexico, Brazil, Costa Rica, Panama, Peru, Paraguay, and Colombia.

Another highlight of the year was our presence in global forums on artificial intelligence. Prominent among them were our integration into the Policy Steering Committee of PAI (Partnership on AI), a newly formed coalition that addresses urgent issues on AI governance, and our participation in the Policy Dialogue Week of the C20 TST (Technology, Security and Transparency) Working Group, which represents civil society in the G20. We also attended the International Seminar on AI organized by the Argentine Ministry of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Worship, the EU Delegation of Argentina and Team Europe in Buenos Aires, as well as the workshop Advancing the Bilateral Digital

Policy Dialogue, Data Privacy, and Artificial Intelligence (AI) Governance, conducted by the U.S. Department of State, the U.S. Department of Commerce and the Argentine Ministry of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Worship.

On the other hand, ADC was invited by the Bertelsmann Stiftung Foundation (Germany) to jointly facilitate two days of reflection sessions on disinformation in Latin America. The event took place in Buenos Aires in December and was attended by more than thirty experts from all over the region. The Bertelsmann Stiftung Foundation has long been working on this topic all over the world, holding similar meetings in Africa and Asia, and the decision to choose our organization to head the discussions in the region is a sign of the relevance of our work in the field.



Our strong presence in CSISAC, the voice of civil society in the OECD (Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development) Committee on Digital Economy Policy is of particular significance. Our executive director spoke at its 91st Session in Paris, France, as a member of the Steering Committee, where she displayed bold leadership that buttressed the role of civic organizations in the OECD.

Finally, we took part in the monthly meetings of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) Study Group seeking to develop a standard establishing a uniform set of definitions and a procedure for the acquisition of Artificial Intelligence and Automated Decision Systems.

ADC not only contributes to various global forums of relevance but also partners with other

international organizations to generate knowledge and influence public policies that adopt the human rights perspective in the field of technology. Thus, we continue as members of the IFEX network, where we approach the issue of freedom of expression concerning the digital realm, and in the Privacy International Network, where we contribute with quality research. We also pursue as members of the AI Sur Consortium, providing documents and reaching common standpoints.

 - We sent *inputs in response to the public call made by the IACHR Special Rapporteur for Freedom of Expression* (RELE in Spanish) and the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). The purpose is to cooperate in the consultation phase of a project that seeks to identify recurring challenges and best practices for stakeholders of the Americas in the United Nations Universal Periodic Review (UPR).

- 16**
 - The Association for Civil Rights expressed its concern about the attempt by the Executive to impeach all members of the Argentinian Supreme Court. *We regard the initiative*

as inadmissible since the arguments proposed are based mainly on the content of their rulings.

- 17**
 - We published *a new article* on our microsite Espacio Cívico en Línea (Online Civic Space), addressing the issue of digital gender violence after a ruling issued in the province of Formosa.

- 20**
 - On the eve of the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) report for Argentina, *we requested the inclusion of recommendations* concerning the failure to appoint a National Ombudsman, privacy protection in surveillance technologies, the vulnerability of public databases, and the threats of cyber patrolling.

- 25 ADC *considered the decision of the telecommunications regulatory body* (ENACOM) to compel companies to adopt facial recognition in their cell phones as disproportionate.

FEBRUARY

- 1 Together with other civil society representatives, we took part in the virtual consultation of the IACHR Special Rapporteur for Freedom of Expression (RELE in Spanish) and the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to discuss and ponder on barriers to and good practices for the participation of different actors from the Americas in the United Nations Universal Periodic Review (UPR).

- 2 We met with the organizations that form the AI Sur consortium in Sao Paulo, Brazil, to articulate and plan future projects.

- Given the official visit by the UN Working Group on Business and Human Rights to Argentina, ADC **offered input on the National Plan on Business and Human Rights** and its adoption of a digital perspective.

- 6 Together with civil society groups and representatives, we attended the periodic meeting of the UN B-Tech Project to promote the implementation of the Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights in technology.

- 8 We released **a report scrutinizing the national**

Conectar Igualdad program and assessing its impact on child and adolescent protection in the digital sphere, providing recommendations for bolstering security.

- 14 We published **a new article** on our microsite Espacio Cívico en Línea (Online Civic Space) reviewing the effects of social networks as mediators of the relationship between politics and citizens.

- 15 In response to the public consultation on the Second National Cyber Security Strategy, **we formulated proposals** condensing principles and criteria acquired from our vast experience in the field. Our organization believes digital security policies must be centered on



the individual and developed following human rights standards.

 - We launched **the PubliElectoral report** on election ad expenditure in social media for the Exit Plebiscite in Chile, prepared together with the organization Derechos Digitales.
 - We took part in the meeting with civil society held during the UN Business and Human Rights Group’s visit to the country. **We shared our recommendations for adopting a digital perspective** in national action plans, in general and specifically in Argentina.

 - **We spoke on healthcare data privacy** at the Ibero-American Data Protection Meeting, held in Bolivia.

MARCH

- 6
 - **Our Executive Director, Valeria Milanes, attended the C20 Working Group TST Policy Dialogue Week.** C20 is the engagement group representing civil society in the G20. Ms. Milanes had been invited to discuss Artificial Intelligence and information for society.

 - **We submitted input** in response to a call from the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR), sharing views on the link between human rights and technical standard-setting processes for digital technologies.

 - Within the commemoration of International Women’s Day, **we signed a ten-point plan** to prevent and eradicate online gender violence with other civil society organizations, journalists, referents, and the Public Defender’s Office of Buenos Aires City.

- 14**

 - **We presented our new report, *Who defends your data? Argentina 2022*** and discussed data protection as a central issue for the exercise of digital rights at a meeting held with a group of journalists.

- 17**

 - We published **a new article** on our microsite, Online Civic Space, delving into the topic of nipple censorship on Instagram, where we address the controversy that puts stereotypes around sexuality, education, and the exercise of rights into question.

 - **We released our fourth and last thematic newsletter, “Let’s Talk about Accessibility”**, reviewing the topic through articles written by our PUEDA team members and how accessibility relates to information, communication, work, health, citizen participation, and access to education.

 - **We attended the International Seminar on Artificial Intelligence** in Buenos Aires, organized by the Argentine Ministry of Foreign Affairs, International Trade and Worship, the Delegation of the European Union in Argentina and Team Europe.

 - **We joined 45 organizations** and demanded that world leaders, technology companies, and investors prevent the abuse and misuse of spyware, recognizing the risks they pose to human rights.

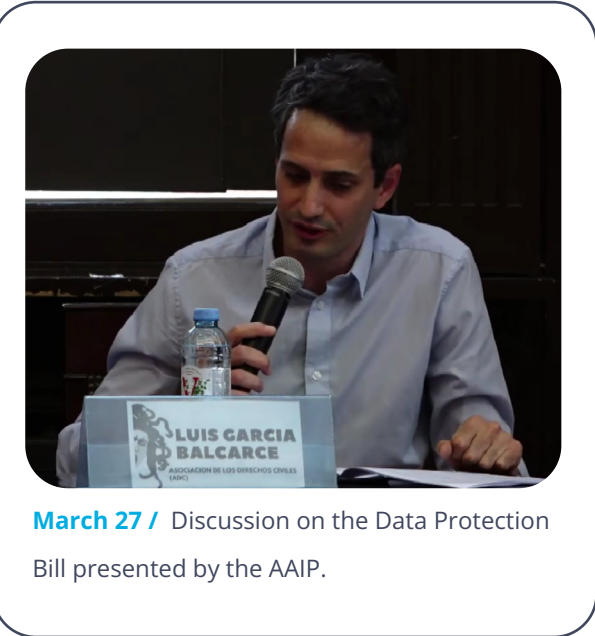

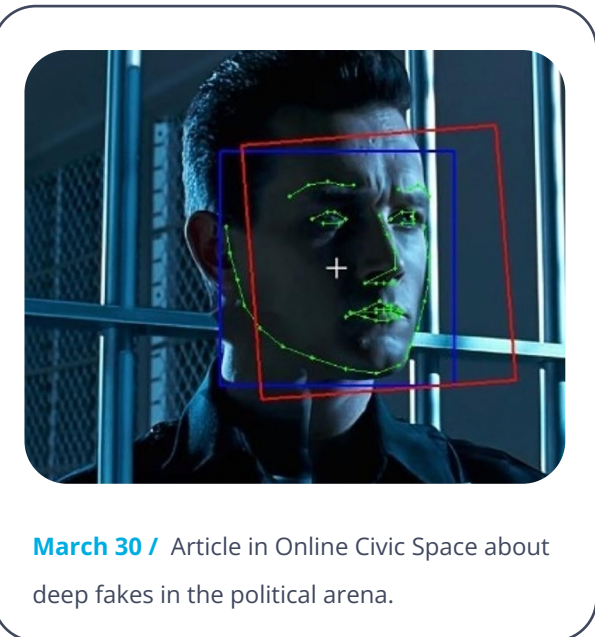
APRIL

- 10**
 - We provided input in response to a call on civil society organizations made by the UN Special Rapporteur to comply with the mandate to develop “specific technical and practical tools to assist law enforcement in promoting and protecting human rights in the context of peaceful protests,” to be presented at the 55th session of the Human Rights Council.

- 11**
 - We launched a dossier with different views on the mechanisms governing the Argentine Council of the Magistracy, with articles written by Gustavo Arballo, Florencia Burdeos, Ornela Mazza Gigena, Juan Nardi, Tomás Pomar and Andrea Castagnola.

 - We organized a round-table discussion, “Magistracy Council: Moving towards more transparent justice?” to debate the challenges of redesigning, improving transparency, and enhancing the procedures of the body in charge of selecting judges.

- 25 • We responded to the regional virtual consultation on freedom of expression and online gender-based violence opened by the United Nations Special Rapporteur on Freedom of Expression, the Association for Progressive Communications (APC), and TEDIC.

- 26 • We released a new article on our microsite **Espacio Cívico en Línea (Online Civic Space): "Is there neutrality in AI?"** where we examine racial bias in such automated systems.

- 27 • With more than a hundred registrants and sustained

participation of over thirty people throughout the day, we held **ADC in Focus: Elections and Technology**, a virtual meeting where specialists from all over the Americas discussed how the use of social media impacts elections and the exercise of political citizenship.

In our presentation, we stressed the need to consider a digital perspective cross-cutting all the Permanent Commissions of the organization.

On this occasion, two vacancies were opened for Karen Vergara, from Chile, and Verónica Rocha, from Bolivia, who studied the digital dimension of political violence against women from May to July. The researchers had the opportunity to collaborate with the ADC team in our Buenos Aires offices from June 12 to 16 and received online training through the ADC Campus.

- **We launched a Practical Guide to Making Online Meetings Accesible**, summarizing the lessons learned from our five-year-long journey encouraging organizations and users to include digital accessibility in their events and thus guarantee fundamental rights.

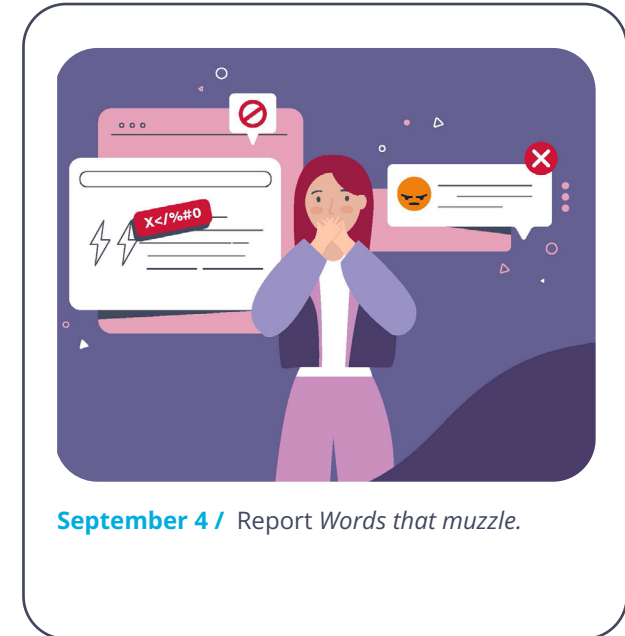

JANUARY

- As part of our promotion in social media of the organization's microsites, we focused this month on **PubliElectoral** and **Quiero Mis Datos** (I Want My Data). The former is dedicated to the PubliElectoral project and gathers all the research and main findings on the transparency of campaign spending on social media platforms, in Argentina and throughout the region. The latter, Quiero Mis Datos, aims to create awareness of the obligation companies have to provide details of the data collected from us, the use they make of it, and the people with whom it is shared.

FEBRUARY

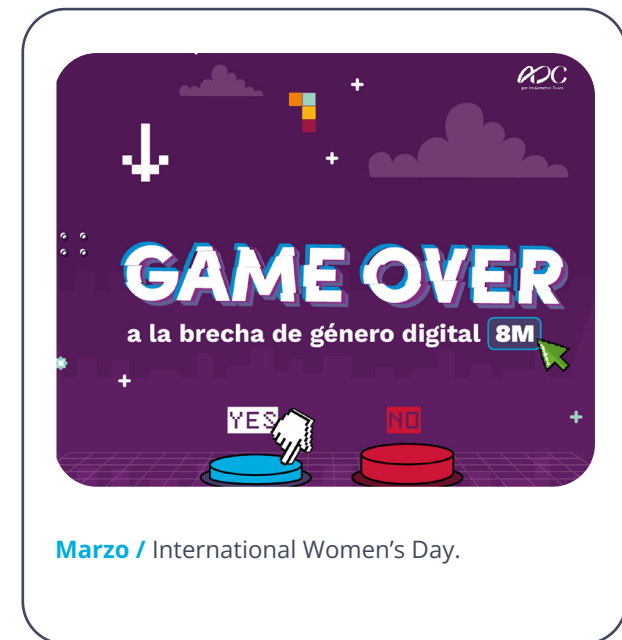
- For **Safer Internet Day**, we posted information badges with

key tips to promote responsible, respectful, critical, and creative use of technology.

- Following the release of **Childhood, Adolescence and Technology in Education: the Conectar Igualdad Case**, we put up posts sharing the report's basic concepts, while inviting the public to read and download it on our website.

MARCH

- On **International Women's Day**, we launched a series of publications highlighting the gender digital divide. In addition, we shared a video where ADC's female staff members explain how inequality impacts the technology sector and why it should be contested. The video attained more than six thousand views and five hundred interactions.





- After presenting the third edition of *Who Defends Your Data?* which inquires into the measures companies take to protect people's personal information, we published content summarizing some of its conclusions, and inviting you to read and download it on our website.

APRIL

- Following the request for applications on March 27, we conducted a social media promotion campaign throughout the entire process, from notice to implementation and experience, of **ADC Fellowship** in its third edition. On this occasion, the contest had two winners, Verónica Rocha (Bolivia) and Karen Vergara Sánchez (Chile), who attended the program between May 15 and July 14. The call was widely replicated

in social media by organizations from all over the region.

MAY

- We publicized the practical guide *Accessible Virtual Events* with three posts that highlight the main features to be considered before, during, and after the organization of an online meeting.

JUNE

- We celebrated our 28th anniversary with **a video clip, in which our executive director**





reviews the organization's achievements and renews our commitment to defending fundamental rights, with a special focus on the digital sphere in Argentina and Latin America.

- We started a social media campaign to disseminate **the latest practical guides published by ADC**, inviting you to download them from our website: *How to Start Addressing your Digital Security, Accessible Virtual Events, Digital Sources and the Challenge of Communicating amid Disinformation and Distrust, and the Protest Guide.*

SEPTEMBER

- We publicized our study ***Words that Muzzle - Self-censorship by Women in Politics as a Response to Online Gender Violence*** through a series of posts featuring the

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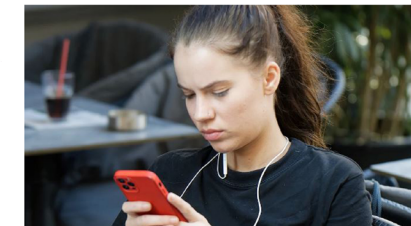
